Upon returning home from Pakistan, Mortenson is reminded that time doesn't stand still during his absences: Tara gives birth to a baby girl and Hoerni is on his deathbed. Before Hoerni succumbs to cancer, though, he endows Mortenson's Central Asia Institute with \$1 million. Over the course of the next couple of years, Mortenson continues building schools in Pakistan.
