The second chapter then provides practical considerations for educators in the K-12 classroom, building teacher capacity both to work against the structures, policies, curriculum, and pedagogies that limit marginalized students' flourishing and to build the capabilities for flourishing in all students. Readers are provided with practical guidelines to help them approach each chapter with openness, humility, and critical engagement. *Diversity and Equity in Canadian Schools* is well-suited for Canadian university courses in Education that focus on critical multicultural education and equity, diversity, and inclusion in the classroom.
