No matter what it is, the Catholic Liturgical program constantly reminds us of the need to confess our sins. In every Holy Mass, right from the penitential rite, to the Kyrie eleison invocation, the Gloria, , and the Creed; we are implored to confess our sins and to receive the promise of forgiveness when we repent of our sin. Then the LORD's Prayer reminds us to ask to be forgiven our sins as we have forgiven those who sinned against us. Before we go to Holy Communion, we again acknowledge our unworthiness to receive the Eucharistic LORD; but in faith, by His word, we are cleansed to become worthy to receive Him.... ..when we are not in mortal sin (cf. 1 Corinthians 11:29), of which we are required to make the good confession before an appointed priest for absolution of the sin.
