And what is your purpose of visiting the earth or your final purpose limited to the abduction of people with an almost industrial methodology or cadence? I am still looking for answers to my own searches about my own UFO experiences. Regarding the ufological theme, over the years what I have discovered is that the phenomenon is more diverse than one could imagine, the ufo really manifests itself as a Monster with thousands of arms and an impossible and unclassifiable face. The great edifice of ufology ranges from mutilation of cattle, also of people, rarer cases but there are, to out-of-body experiences of an angelic astral type, taking samples where ships land, reports of direct and programmed contact where human beings knowingly and intentionally board a ship, perhaps never to return.
