THIS LINGUISTIC CHOICE CONTRIBUTED SIGNIFICANTLY TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF ENGLISH AS A LITERARY LANGUAGE AND HELPED TO PRESERVE THE CULTURAL IDENTITY OF ENGLAND DURING A PERIOD OF POLITICAL AND SOCIAL UPHEAVAL.

FRAME NARRATIVE AND STORYTELLING STRUCTURE

THE PROLOGUE FUNCTIONS AS THE FRAME NARRATIVE, A TECHNIQUE THAT ORGANIZES THE DIVERSE TALES WITHIN A COHESIVE STRUCTURE. FOR INSTANCE, THE DEPICTION OF THE PARDONER'S GREED AND THE FRIAR'S MANIPULATIVE BEHAVIOR EXPOSES CLERICAL CORRUPTION WITH SUBTLE HUMOR AND BITING COMMENTARY. THESE SATIRICAL PORTRAYALS ENCOURAGE READERS TO QUESTION THE AUTHENTICITY AND INTEGRITY OF ESTABLISHED AUTHORITIES.

COMPARATIVE PERSPECTIVES: THE PROLOGUE IN LITERARY TRADITION

THE PROLOGUE'S STRUCTURE HAS INFLUENCED COUNTLESS LATER WORKS THAT UTILIZE FRAME NARRATIVES TO EXPLORE SOCIAL DIVERSITY AND HUMAN COMPLEXITY. ITS BLEND OF REALISM AND ALLEGORY ANTICIPATES RENAISSANCE HUMANISM AND MODERN NARRATIVE TECHNIQUES, POSITIONING CHAUCER AS A PIVOTAL FIGURE IN THE EVOLUTION OF ENGLISH LITERATURE.

ADDITIONALLY, SOME CHARACTERS' PORTRAYALS MAY REFLECT THE BIASES AND STEREOTYPES OF CHAUCER'S TIME, WHICH NECESSITATES CRITICAL CONTEXTUAL READING.

LEGACY AND CONTINUING RELEVANCE

THE PROLOGUE TO THE CANTERBURY TALES CONTINUES TO CAPTIVATE SCHOLARS, STUDENTS, AND GENERAL READERS ALIKE. ITS MULTIDIMENSIONAL CHARACTERS AND INCISIVE SOCIAL COMMENTARY OFFER A TIMELESS EXPLORATION OF HUMAN NATURE AND SOCIETAL STRUCTURES. In particular, rather than reading the works of medieval authors as addressing us across the centuries about some timeless or ahistorical 'human condition', critics from a wide range of theoretical approaches have in recent years shown how the work of poets such as Chaucer constituted engagements with the power relations and social inequalities of their time. Yet, perhaps surprisingly, medieval historians have played little part in this 'historical turn' in the study of medieval literature. The aim of this volume is to allow historians who are experts in the fields of economic, social, political, religious, and intellectual history the chance to interpret one of the most famous works of Middle English literature, Geoffrey Chaucer's 'General Prologue' to the Canterbury Tales, in its contemporary context.
