INDIVIDUAL VS. INSTITUTIONAL RACISM

A COMMON DISTINCTION MADE IN SOCIOLOGY IS BETWEEN INDIVIDUAL RACISM AND INSTITUTIONAL RACISM.

- ****INDIVIDUAL RACISM**** INVOLVES PERSONAL BELIEFS, ATTITUDES, AND ACTIONS THAT EXPRESS PREJUDICE OR DISCRIMINATION TOWARDS PEOPLE BASED ON THEIR RACE. THIS COULD BE OVERT, LIKE RACIAL SLURS, OR SUBTLE, LIKE IMPLICIT BIASES AFFECTING DECISIONS.
- ****INSTITUTIONAL RACISM**** REFERS TO POLICIES, PRACTICES, AND SOCIAL NORMS WITHIN ORGANIZATIONS AND INSTITUTIONS THAT SYSTEMATICALLY DISADVANTAGE CERTAIN RACIAL GROUPS. EXAMPLES INCLUDE DISPARITIES IN EDUCATION, CRIMINAL JUSTICE, HOUSING, AND EMPLOYMENT.

UNDERSTANDING THIS DISTINCTION IS CRUCIAL BECAUSE IT HIGHLIGHTS THAT RACISM IS NOT JUST ABOUT PERSONAL ANIMOSITY BUT IS DEEPLY WOVEN INTO SOCIETAL STRUCTURES.
