Modern education reform is focused on transferable and essential skills like critical thinking, effective communication, and collaboration known as 21st century skills. The California History Social Science Framework (2016) emphasizes teaching 21st century skills within the backdrop of Social Science content in order to better prepare students to be college and career ready by high school graduation and to diminish the equity gap between EL students, students of color, students with disabilities, socioeconomically disadvantaged students compared to White students. These standards focus on critical thinking, problem solving, writing historical arguments supported by evidence, and collaboration. This study examined the impact of teaching 21st century skills within the History/Social Science classroom on English learner (EL) success towards college and career readiness. A qualitative study of four work samples examined EL proficiency in History/Social Science compared to their non-EL peers. Three work samples were designed to teach and assess 21st century skills, and one work sample was a traditional, multiple-choice assessment. Each work sample was pattern-coded to find evidence of historical thinking skills synthesis, source analysis, and writing a historical argument supported by evidence. This study found curriculum designed to teach and assess 21st century skills improved overall EL proficiency in History/Social Science class, reduced the equity gap between EL students and non-EL students within the classroom, and contributed to greater EL college and career readiness. It is recommended based on the results of this study to implement a curriculum designed to teach and assess 21st century skills at all levels of History/Social Science learning with appropriate pedagogical support. With greater access for EL students to curriculum designed to teach and assess 21st century skills, the equity gap may be diminished, paving the way for better access to innovations of the 21st century economy like post-secondary education and employment mobility to reduce social inequities for EL students and people of color in California.

A College And Career Readiness Course For At-risk Middle School Students Isabella DiBileo, 2016 This honors thesis served multiple purposes: to present information on current best practices for school counselors regarding College and Career Readiness (CCR), design and implement a curriculum for middle grades students at-risk for educational progress, implement the curriculum in a middle school, evaluate the effectiveness of the curriculum, as well as determine the curriculum's alignment with national standards. A middle school agreed to participate by allowing me to complete my internship in the counseling office, which included permitting me to implement my College and Career Readiness curriculum as an elective course over the course of one semester. The curriculum that was designed and implemented was guided by research and national standards for school counselors. A total of 11 middle school students volunteered to participate in my study by enrolling in the course. Narrative responses from

students were collected prior to initiating the curriculum, and again near completion. Data from time two indicates College and Career Readiness growth for students, and most could verbalize possible barriers to their own college and career goals. Most students demonstrated improved awareness of college admissions procedures as well as realistic career choices. No student indicated that the curriculum was useless, and the mean usefulness score was 4.54 out of 5. Additionally, the course curriculum is aligned with 100% of the competencies listed within the American School Counselor Association's National Standards for Students.

Simply put, today's high school graduates need a broad-based education that combines an array of knowledge, skills, and experiences to prepare them for life after high school. And indeed, state's definitions of college and career readiness have broadened in recent years to include a variety of skills and dispositions, such as critical thinking skills, social emotional skills such as collaboration, and interpersonal skills such as resilience and perseverance (English, Rasmussen, Cushing, & Therriault, 2016). The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015, the key federal K-12 legislation, explicitly supports the notion of a well-rounded student, emphasizing readiness in areas beyond its predecessor's (the No Child Left Behind Act, or NCLB) focus on core academic content. ESSA mandates that states ensure that students are provided an enriched, accelerated curriculum beyond courses and content areas in which state assessments are given (e.g., mathematics, reading) and that is aligned with the postsecondary experiences students are likely to encounter. ESSA also supports an expansion of readiness goals through provisions for the

improvement of conditions for student learning that support social-emotional learning, intrapersonal skills, and other employability skills. And ESSA includes provisions in states' accountability systems that support emphasis on broader definitions of readiness. Additionally, ESSA's accountability framework includes important principles for supporting a broader definition of what students need to know and be able to do once they graduate high school. Accountability systems under ESSA may include multiple measures of college and career readiness. Indeed, several states had already added a career-focused indicator prior to ESSA passing (such as pathway completion or technical assessment achievement) to their accountability systems, and the number of states publicly reporting such indicators continues to increase (Achieve & AdvanceCTE, 2016). As definitions and measures of college and career readiness continue to evolve, we know one thing for sure: we need to better prepare ALL students for success after high school. This book explores the ways in which some education researchers are approaching this task.
