HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT: BREAKING BARRIERS AND SHAPING JUSTICE

HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT IS A FASCINATING JOURNEY FILLED WITH COURAGE, PERSEVERANCE, AND GROUNDBREAKING ACHIEVEMENTS. WHILE POLICING HAS TRADITIONALLY BEEN SEEN AS A MALE-DOMINATED PROFESSION, WOMEN HAVE PLAYED CRUCIAL ROLES IN SHAPING MODERN LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES AROUND THE WORLD. FROM THE EARLIEST PIONEERS WHO CHALLENGED SOCIETAL NORMS TO TODAY'S FEMALE OFFICERS SERVING IN EVERY CAPACITY IMAGINABLE, THE STORY OF WOMEN IN POLICING OFFERS A RICH PERSPECTIVE ON EQUALITY, JUSTICE, AND SOCIAL PROGRESS.

THE EARLY BEGINNINGS: PIONEERS AND TRAILBLAZERS

THE HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT DATES BACK TO THE LATE 19TH AND EARLY 20TH CENTURIES WHEN WOMEN FIRST BEGAN TO ENTER POLICING ROLES, OFTEN IN LIMITED OR SPECIALIZED POSITIONS. AT A TIME WHEN SOCIETAL EXPECTATIONS CONFINED WOMEN TO DOMESTIC ROLES, THOSE WHO JOINED LAW ENFORCEMENT WERE BREAKING NEW GROUND.

THE FIRST FEMALE POLICE OFFICERS

ONE OF THE EARLIEST RECORDED FEMALE POLICE OFFICERS WAS MARIE OWENS, WHO SERVED IN CHICAGO FROM 1891. HER DUTIES PRIMARILY INVOLVED ENFORCING CHILD LABOR LAWS AND SAFEGUARDING WOMEN AND CHILDREN, REFLECTING EARLY SOCIETAL VIEWS THAT WOMEN OFFICERS WERE BEST SUITED FOR SOCIAL WORK-RELATED POLICING.

IN 1910, ALICE STEBBINS WELLS BECAME THE FIRST OFFICIAL FEMALE POLICE OFFICER IN THE LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT. WELLS IS OFTEN CREDITED WITH ADVOCATING FOR THE RECRUITMENT OF WOMEN IN POLICING, EMPHASIZING THE NEED FOR FEMALE OFFICERS TO HANDLE CASES INVOLVING WOMEN AND CHILDREN SENSITIVELY AND EFFECTIVELY.

EARLY ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

FEMALE OFFICERS IN THE EARLY 1900S WERE OFTEN LIMITED TO ROLES SUCH AS MATRONS IN JAILS OR SOCIAL WORKERS. THEIR WORK WAS LARGELY FOCUSED ON ISSUES LIKE JUVENILE DELINQUENCY, PROSTITUTION, AND DOMESTIC VIOLENCE—AREAS WHERE THEIR PRESENCE WAS CONSIDERED SOCIALLY APPROPRIATE. DESPITE THESE CONSTRAINTS, WOMEN WERE LAYING THE FOUNDATION FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS BY PROVING THEIR CAPABILITY IN LAW ENFORCEMENT DUTIES.

THE MID-20TH CENTURY: EXPANDING ROLES AND RECOGNITION

AS THE WORLD MOVED THROUGH THE MID-1900S, THE ROLE OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT BEGAN TO EVOLVE. WORLD WARS I AND II PLAYED A SIGNIFICANT PART IN THIS TRANSFORMATION, AS MANY MEN WERE DEPLOYED OVERSEAS, OPENING UP OPPORTUNITIES FOR WOMEN IN VARIOUS PROFESSIONS, INCLUDING POLICING.

WORLD WARS AND INCREASED OPPORTUNITIES

DURING WORLD WAR II, WOMEN WERE RECRUITED TO FILL ROLES TRADITIONALLY HELD BY MEN, INCLUDING POSITIONS IN POLICE FORCES. THIS PERIOD SAW AN INCREASE IN FEMALE OFFICERS WHO TOOK ON MORE ACTIVE AND DIVERSE RESPONSIBILITIES, ALTHOUGH MANY WERE EXPECTED TO RETURN TO TRADITIONAL ROLES ONCE MEN RETURNED FROM WAR.

BREAKING THE GLASS CEILING

THE 1960S AND 70S MARKED A TURNING POINT. THE RISE OF THE FEMINIST MOVEMENT AND BROADER SOCIAL CHANGES PUSHED FOR GENDER EQUALITY IN ALL SECTORS, INCLUDING LAW ENFORCEMENT. WOMEN BEGAN TO BE ACCEPTED INTO REGULAR POLICING ROLES, RECEIVED FORMAL TRAINING AT POLICE ACADEMIES, AND STARTED TO PATROL STREETS, CONDUCT INVESTIGATIONS, AND PARTICIPATE IN ARRESTING SUSPECTS.

ONE NOTABLE MILESTONE WAS THE APPOINTMENT OF WOMEN AS DETECTIVES AND SUPERVISORS, POSITIONS PREVIOUSLY RESERVED FOR MEN. THESE ADVANCEMENTS WERE CRUCIAL FOR CHALLENGING STEREOTYPES AND DEMONSTRATING WOMEN'S COMPETENCE IN HIGH-PRESSURE, FRONTLINE ROLES.

MODERN ERA: WOMEN LEADING AND INNOVATING IN POLICING

TODAY, THE HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT IS CHARACTERIZED BY SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS BUT ALSO ONGOING CHALLENGES. WOMEN SERVE AS OFFICERS, DETECTIVES, CHIEFS, AND IN SPECIALIZED UNITS SUCH AS SWAT TEAMS, CYBERCRIME DIVISIONS, AND COUNTER-TERRORISM SQUADS.

LEADERSHIP AND REPRESENTATION

WOMEN HAVE INCREASINGLY RISEN TO LEADERSHIP ROLES WITHIN POLICE DEPARTMENTS WORLDWIDE. FEMALE POLICE CHIEFS AND COMMISSIONERS ARE BECOMING MORE COMMON, BRINGING FRESH PERSPECTIVES TO LAW ENFORCEMENT POLICIES AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS. THEIR LEADERSHIP OFTEN EMPHASIZES TRANSPARENCY, DE-ESCALATION, AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, RESHAPING THE WAY POLICING IS CONDUCTED.

CHALLENGES STILL FACED BY WOMEN IN POLICING

DESPITE THESE ADVANCES, WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT STILL FACE OBSTACLES, INCLUDING GENDER BIAS, HARASSMENT, AND BALANCING WORK-LIFE DEMANDS IN A DEMANDING PROFESSION. MANY DEPARTMENTS ARE ACTIVELY WORKING TO CREATE SUPPORTIVE ENVIRONMENTS THROUGH MENTORSHIP PROGRAMS, DIVERSITY TRAINING, AND POLICIES AIMED AT EQUALITY.

THE IMPORTANCE OF DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

RESEARCH SHOWS THAT DIVERSE POLICE FORCES CAN IMPROVE COMMUNITY TRUST AND EFFECTIVENESS. WOMEN OFFICERS OFTEN BRING UNIQUE SKILLS IN COMMUNICATION AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION, HELPING TO REDUCE VIOLENCE AND IMPROVE OUTCOMES IN SENSITIVE SITUATIONS. DEPARTMENTS THAT ACTIVELY RECRUIT AND RETAIN WOMEN CONTRIBUTE TO A MORE BALANCED AND JUST APPROACH TO LAW ENFORCEMENT.

HISTORICAL IMPACT AND CULTURAL SHIFTS

THE HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT IS NOT JUST ABOUT THEIR PRESENCE IN THE PROFESSION BUT ABOUT HOW THEIR INVOLVEMENT HAS INFLUENCED BROADER CULTURAL AND SOCIETAL ATTITUDES TOWARD GENDER ROLES AND JUSTICE.

CHANGING PERCEPTIONS OF POLICING

WOMEN OFFICERS CHALLENGED THE TRADITIONAL IMAGE OF POLICING AS A PURELY PHYSICAL, AGGRESSIVE JOB BY

DEMONSTRATING THE VALUE OF EMPATHY, NEGOTIATION, AND SOCIAL AWARENESS. THIS SHIFT HAS HELPED MODERNIZE POLICING STRATEGIES AND IMPROVE INTERACTIONS BETWEEN OFFICERS AND THE COMMUNITIES THEY SERVE.

INFLUENCE ON POLICY AND REFORM

FEMALE OFFICERS HAVE OFTEN BEEN AT THE FOREFRONT OF PUSHING FOR REFORMS IN HANDLING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, AND CHILD ABUSE CASES. THEIR ADVOCACY HAS LED TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF VICTIM-CENTERED APPROACHES AND SPECIALIZED UNITS WITHIN POLICE DEPARTMENTS, IMPROVING SUPPORT SYSTEMS FOR VULNERABLE POPULATIONS.

A LOOK AHEAD: THE FUTURE OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT

THE JOURNEY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT CONTINUES TO EVOLVE. WITH ONGOING EFFORTS TO INCREASE RECRUITMENT, ENHANCE TRAINING, AND CREATE EQUITABLE WORKPLACE CULTURES, THE FUTURE HOLDS PROMISING POSSIBILITIES FOR GREATER GENDER BALANCE AND LEADERSHIP DIVERSITY IN POLICING.

TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCEMENTS AND NEW ROLES

AS LAW ENFORCEMENT INCREASINGLY INTEGRATES TECHNOLOGY—SUCH AS BODY CAMERAS, DATA ANALYTICS, AND CYBERCRIME UNITS—WOMEN ARE PLAYING KEY ROLES IN THESE CUTTING-EDGE FIELDS. THEIR PARTICIPATION ENSURES THAT POLICING KEEPS PACE WITH MODERN CHALLENGES AND BENEFITS FROM DIVERSE TALENTS.

PROMOTING MENTORSHIP AND SUPPORT NETWORKS

TO SUSTAIN PROGRESS, MANY ORGANIZATIONS EMPHASIZE MENTORSHIP PROGRAMS THAT CONNECT EXPERIENCED FEMALE OFFICERS WITH NEWCOMERS. THESE NETWORKS PROVIDE GUIDANCE, ENCOURAGEMENT, AND STRATEGIES FOR OVERCOMING WORKPLACE CHALLENGES, HELPING RETAIN TALENTED WOMEN IN THE FORCE.

THE HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT IS RICH, COMPLEX, AND INSPIRING. FROM HUMBLE BEGINNINGS TO LEADERSHIP ROLES SHAPING MODERN POLICING, WOMEN CONTINUE TO BREAK BARRIERS AND REDEFINE WHAT IT MEANS TO SERVE AND PROTECT. THEIR ONGOING CONTRIBUTIONS NOT ONLY ENHANCE LAW ENFORCEMENT BUT ALSO PROMOTE JUSTICE AND EQUITY IN SOCIETY AT LARGE.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHEN DID WOMEN FIRST START WORKING IN LAW ENFORCEMENT?

WOMEN FIRST BEGAN WORKING IN LAW ENFORCEMENT IN THE LATE 19TH AND EARLY 20TH CENTURIES, WITH EARLY ROLES OFTEN LIMITED TO SOCIAL WORK OR ADMINISTRATIVE DUTIES RATHER THAN FULL POLICE POWERS.

WHO WAS THE FIRST FEMALE POLICE OFFICER IN THE UNITED STATES?

ALICE STEBBINS WELLS IS WIDELY RECOGNIZED AS THE FIRST AMERICAN-BORN FEMALE POLICE OFFICER WITH ARREST POWERS, JOINING THE LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT IN 1910.

WHAT CHALLENGES DID EARLY WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT FACE?

EARLY WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT FACED SIGNIFICANT CHALLENGES SUCH AS GENDER DISCRIMINATION, LIMITED AUTHORITY, LOW PAY, SKEPTICISM FROM MALE COLLEAGUES, AND RESTRICTED ROLES PRIMARILY FOCUSED ON WOMEN AND CHILDREN.

HOW DID THE ROLE OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT EVOLVE DURING THE 20TH CENTURY?

THROUGHOUT THE 20TH CENTURY, WOMEN GRADUALLY MOVED FROM CLERICAL AND SOCIAL WORK ROLES INTO PATROL AND DETECTIVE POSITIONS, GAINING FULL POLICE POWERS AND INCREASING REPRESENTATION IN VARIOUS LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES.

WHAT IMPACT DID WORLD WAR II HAVE ON WOMEN'S PARTICIPATION IN LAW ENFORCEMENT?

WORLD WAR II CREATED LABOR SHORTAGES THAT ALLOWED MORE WOMEN TO ENTER LAW ENFORCEMENT, TAKING ON ROLES TRADITIONALLY HELD BY MEN, WHICH HELPED PAVE THE WAY FOR FUTURE INTEGRATION AND EXPANDED RESPONSIBILITIES.

WHO ARE SOME NOTABLE TRAILBLAZING WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT HISTORY?

NOTABLE TRAILBLAZERS INCLUDE ALICE STEBBINS WELLS, GEORGIA ANN ROBINSON (FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN FEMALE OFFICER IN LAPD), AND PENNY HARRINGTON, THE FIRST FEMALE CHIEF OF POLICE IN A MAJOR U.S. CITY (PORTLAND, OREGON).

HOW HAS THE REPRESENTATION OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT CHANGED IN RECENT DECADES?

IN RECENT DECADES, WOMEN'S REPRESENTATION IN LAW ENFORCEMENT HAS STEADILY INCREASED DUE TO EFFORTS TOWARD GENDER EQUALITY, RECRUITMENT INITIATIVES, AND CHANGING SOCIETAL ATTITUDES, THOUGH WOMEN STILL REMAIN UNDERREPRESENTED IN MANY AGENCIES.

HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT REVEALS A COMPELLING NARRATIVE OF PERSEVERANCE, GRADUAL INCLUSION, AND TRANSFORMATIVE IMPACT WITHIN A TRADITIONALLY MALE-DOMINATED FIELD. THE ORIGINS AND EARLY ROLES OF WOMEN IN POLICING

THE HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT DATES BACK TO THE LATE 19TH AND EARLY 20TH CENTURIES, A PERIOD MARKED BY SIGNIFICANT SOCIETAL SHIFTS SUCH AS INDUSTRIALIZATION, URBANIZATION, AND THE WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE MOVEMENT. INITIALLY, WOMEN'S INVOLVEMENT IN POLICING WAS LIMITED AND OFTEN INFORMAL. IN MANY CASES, THEY SERVED AS VOLUNTEERS OR SOCIAL WORKERS RATHER THAN SWORN OFFICERS, FOCUSING PRIMARILY ON ISSUES RELATED TO WOMEN AND CHILDREN.

ONE OF THE EARLIEST RECORDED INSTANCES OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT OCCURRED IN THE UNITED STATES IN THE EARLY 1900S. ALICE STEBBINS WELLS BECAME THE FIRST AMERICAN POLICEWOMAN WITH ARREST POWERS IN 1910 WHEN SHE JOINED THE LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT. SIMILARLY, OTHER COUNTRIES WITNESSED PARALLEL DEVELOPMENTS; FOR EXAMPLE, IN

THE UNITED KINGDOM, EDITH SMITH WAS APPOINTED AS THE FIRST FEMALE POLICE CONSTABLE WITH FULL POWERS OF ARREST IN 1915.

THE EARLY ROLES OF WOMEN OFFICERS WERE OFTEN RESTRICTED TO “WOMEN’S ISSUES” SUCH AS DEALING WITH PROSTITUTION, JUVENILE DELINQUENCY, AND DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. THIS SPECIALIZATION, WHILE LIMITING IN SCOPE, PAVED THE WAY FOR GRADUAL ACCEPTANCE OF WOMEN IN POLICING BY DEMONSTRATING THEIR UNIQUE SKILLS AND PERSPECTIVES IN HANDLING SENSITIVE SOCIAL PROBLEMS.

CHALLENGES AND BARRIERS IN EARLY INTEGRATION

DESPITE THESE MILESTONES, WOMEN FACED SUBSTANTIAL INSTITUTIONAL AND CULTURAL BARRIERS. LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES WERE OVERWHELMINGLY MALE, AND PREVAILING STEREOTYPES QUESTIONED WOMEN’S PHYSICAL AND EMOTIONAL SUITABILITY FOR POLICE WORK. RECRUITMENT STANDARDS, TRAINING PROGRAMS, AND PROMOTIONAL OPPORTUNITIES WERE OFTEN DESIGNED AROUND MALE NORMS, FURTHER MARGINALIZING FEMALE OFFICERS.

MOREOVER, LIMITED LEGAL PROTECTIONS AND WORKPLACE POLICIES CONTRIBUTED TO HOSTILE ENVIRONMENTS. WOMEN FREQUENTLY ENCOUNTERED DISCRIMINATION, HARASSMENT, AND EXCLUSION FROM CRITICAL ASSIGNMENTS OR DECISION-MAKING ROLES. THESE CHALLENGES UNDERScoreD THE NEED FOR ADVOCACY AND REFORM TO ENSURE EQUITABLE TREATMENT AND PROFESSIONAL RECOGNITION.

MID-20TH CENTURY EXPANSION AND LEGISLATIVE ADVANCES

THE MID-20TH CENTURY MARKED A SIGNIFICANT TURNING POINT IN THE HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT, DRIVEN BY BROADER SOCIETAL TRANSFORMATIONS INCLUDING WORLD WAR II, CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENTS, AND FEMINIST ACTIVISM. THE WAR EFFORT TEMPORARILY INCREASED WOMEN’S PARTICIPATION IN VARIOUS PROFESSIONS, INCLUDING POLICING, ALTHOUGH OFTEN IN AUXILIARY CAPACITIES.

POST-WAR PERIODS SAW INCREASED PRESSURE TO FORMALIZE WOMEN’S ROLES WITHIN POLICE DEPARTMENTS. LEGISLATIVE CHANGES, SUCH AS THE CIVIL RIGHTS ACT OF 1964 IN THE UNITED STATES, WHICH PROHIBITED EMPLOYMENT DISCRIMINATION BASED ON SEX, PROVIDED A LEGAL FRAMEWORK SUPPORTING WOMEN’S EQUAL ACCESS TO POLICING CAREERS. THESE DEVELOPMENTS COINCIDED WITH POLICE REFORMS FOCUSING ON PROFESSIONALIZATION AND COMMUNITY-ORIENTED POLICING, WHERE WOMEN’S COMMUNICATIVE AND INVESTIGATIVE SKILLS WERE INCREASINGLY VALUED.

GROWTH IN NUMBERS AND DIVERSIFICATION OF ROLES

BY THE 1970S AND 1980S, THE NUMBER OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT GREW STEADILY, REFLECTING NOT ONLY LEGAL MANDATES BUT ALSO EVOLVING PUBLIC ATTITUDES. WOMEN BEGAN TO ENTER MORE DIVERSE ROLES BEYOND TRADITIONAL ASSIGNMENTS, INCLUDING PATROL DUTIES, DETECTIVE WORK, AND SPECIALIZED UNITS SUCH AS NARCOTICS AND FORENSICS.

STATISTICS FROM THE U.S. BUREAU OF JUSTICE INDICATE THAT BY 1990, WOMEN REPRESENTED APPROXIMATELY 7% OF ALL SWORN OFFICERS IN LOCAL POLICE DEPARTMENTS, A NOTICEABLE INCREASE COMPARED TO EARLIER DECADES. HOWEVER, THIS STILL SIGNIFIED UNDERREPRESENTATION RELATIVE TO THE GENERAL POPULATION, POINTING TO PERSISTENT STRUCTURAL AND CULTURAL IMPEDIMENTS.

CONTEMPORARY LANDSCAPE: LEADERSHIP, DIVERSITY, AND CHALLENGES

IN RECENT DECADES, THE HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT HAS BEEN CHARACTERIZED BY SIGNIFICANT STRIDES TOWARDS LEADERSHIP AND VISIBILITY. WOMEN NOW OCCUPY SENIOR RANKS, INCLUDING POLICE CHIEFS, SHERIFFS, AND FEDERAL AGENCY DIRECTORS, EXEMPLIFYING THEIR EXPANDED INFLUENCE WITHIN THE SECTOR. THEIR PRESENCE CONTRIBUTES TO DIVERSE PERSPECTIVES IN LAW ENFORCEMENT POLICY, STRATEGY, AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS.

POSITIVE IMPACTS OF WOMEN IN POLICING

RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS SEVERAL ADVANTAGES ASSOCIATED WITH INCREASED FEMALE REPRESENTATION IN LAW ENFORCEMENT:

- **IMPROVED COMMUNITY RELATIONS:** WOMEN OFFICERS OFTEN EMPHASIZE COMMUNICATION, DE-ESCALATION, AND EMPATHY, WHICH CAN ENHANCE TRUST AND COOPERATION WITH THE PUBLIC.
- **REDUCTION IN USE OF FORCE:** STUDIES SUGGEST FEMALE OFFICERS ARE LESS LIKELY TO RESORT TO EXCESSIVE FORCE, PROMOTING SAFER OUTCOMES DURING ENCOUNTERS.
- **ENHANCED INVESTIGATIVE SKILLS:** WOMEN'S ATTENTION TO DETAIL AND COLLABORATIVE APPROACHES BENEFIT COMPLEX INVESTIGATIONS, PARTICULARLY THOSE INVOLVING SEXUAL ASSAULT OR DOMESTIC VIOLENCE.

ONGOING CHALLENGES AND AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT

DESPITE PROGRESS, WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT CONTINUE TO FACE CHALLENGES SUCH AS:

- **GENDER BIAS AND STEREOTYPES:** PERSISTENT STEREOTYPES ABOUT PHYSICAL STRENGTH AND LEADERSHIP CAPABILITIES CAN HINDER CAREER ADVANCEMENT.
- **WORKPLACE HARASSMENT:** SEXUAL HARASSMENT AND DISCRIMINATION REMAIN CONCERNS IN MANY AGENCIES.
- **WORK-LIFE BALANCE:** THE DEMANDS OF POLICING OFTEN CONFLICT WITH FAMILY RESPONSIBILITIES, DISPROPORTIONATELY AFFECTING WOMEN.

GLOBAL PERSPECTIVES ON WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT

WHILE THE HISTORY OF WOMEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT IN WESTERN NATIONS IS RELATIVELY WELL DOCUMENTED, GLOBAL TRENDS VARY CONSIDERABLY. COUNTRIES LIKE CANADA, AUSTRALIA, AND SEVERAL EUROPEAN NATIONS HAVE SIMILARLY INCREASED FEMALE REPRESENTATION THROUGH PROACTIVE RECRUITMENT AND DIVERSITY INITIATIVES.

IN CONTRAST, WOMEN'S PARTICIPATION IN POLICING IN SOME REGIONS REMAINS MINIMAL DUE TO CULTURAL, LEGAL, OR SECURITY-RELATED CONSTRAINTS. INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS, INCLUDING THE UNITED NATIONS, ADVOCATE FOR GENDER EQUALITY IN LAW ENFORCEMENT AS PART OF BROADER GOALS TO ENHANCE SECURITY AND HUMAN RIGHTS.

INITIATIVES PROMOTING GENDER EQUALITY IN POLICING
