During this stage many engage in activities that they believe make more culturally Korean, such as joining Korean churches and Korean student associations in college. *Questioning What I Have Done* delves into the issues that arise when Korean adoptees explore their multiple identities and the possible effects on relationships with parents and spouses. In *Empowering Identities* the author explores how adoptees are able to take control of their racial and transracial identities by reaching out to parents, prospective parents, and adoption agencies and by educating Korean and Korean Americans about their lives. The final chapter, *Linking the Dance of Identities Theory to Life Experiences*, reiterates for adoptees, parents, adoption agencies, and social justice activists and educators the need for identity journeys and the empowered identities that can result. *The Dance of Identities* is an honest look at the complex nature of race and how we can begin to address race and racism from a fresh perspective.
