WHEN READING A HEBREWS COMMENTARY, IT BECOMES EVIDENT THAT THE LETTER'S ARGUMENTATION IS BOTH THEOLOGICAL AND PASTORAL. INTERPRETATIONS OF HEBREWS VARY AMONG DENOMINATIONS, PARTICULARLY REGARDING THE COVENANTAL FRAMEWORK AND SACRIFICIAL IMAGERY. THE EPISTLE TO THE HEBREWS COMMENTARY OFTEN REFLECTS THESE THEOLOGICAL DIFFERENCES, MAKING IT IMPORTANT FOR READERS TO CONSIDER DENOMINATIONAL CONTEXTS WHEN CONSULTING VARIOUS WORKS.
