KNOWING THESE WORDS BY SIGHT ALLOWS CHILDREN TO FOCUS ON COMPREHENSION AND STORYTELLING RATHER THAN STRUGGLING WITH DECODING EVERY LETTER.

EXAMPLES OF 100 WORDS KIDS NEED TO READ BY 1ST GRADE

HOW TO HELP KIDS LEARN THESE WORDS EFFECTIVELY

INCORPORATE FUN AND INTERACTIVE METHODS

USE MULTI-SENSORY TECHNIQUES

CHILDREN OFTEN BENEFIT FROM MULTI-SENSORY LEARNING APPROACHES. WRITING THE WORDS IN SAND, TRACING THEM WITH FINGERS, OR EVEN USING APPS DESIGNED FOR SIGHT WORD PRACTICE CAN CATER TO DIFFERENT LEARNING STYLES AND HELP RETENTION.

UNDERSTANDING THE ROLE OF PHONICS ALONGSIDE SIGHT WORDS

- CHOOSE AGE-APPROPRIATE BOOKS THAT INCLUDE SIGHT WORDS.
- USE POSITIVE REINFORCEMENT TO BUILD CONFIDENCE.
- ENCOURAGE CHILDREN TO WRITE THEIR SIGHT WORDS IN SENTENCES.
- INTEGRATE SIGHT WORDS INTO EVERYDAY CONVERSATIONS.

WHY EARLY MASTERY OF THESE WORDS MATTERS LONG-TERM

LEARNING THESE FUNDAMENTAL WORDS BY FIRST GRADE LAYS THE GROUNDWORK FOR FUTURE ACADEMIC SUCCESS. THE ROLE OF SIGHT WORDS IN EARLY LITERACY DEVELOPMENT

SIGHT WORDS, OFTEN SYNONYMOUS WITH MANY OF THE 100 WORDS KIDS NEED TO READ BY 1ST GRADE, ARE INTEGRAL TO BUILDING READING FLUENCY. - **DOLCH WORD LIST:** COMPRISES 220 SERVICE WORDS CATEGORIZED BY GRADE LEVELS, WITH A SUBSET OF 100 WORDS RECOMMENDED FOR FIRST GRADERS. IT FOCUSES HEAVILY ON PRONOUNS, PREPOSITIONS, AND COMMON VERBS.
- **FRY SIGHT WORDS:** CONTAINS 1,000 WORDS DIVIDED INTO GROUPS OF 100, RANKED BY FREQUENCY. THE FIRST 100 WORDS ARE TARGETED FOR EARLY READERS, EMPHASIZING A SLIGHTLY BROADER VOCABULARY INCLUDING NOUNS AND ADJECTIVES.

EDUCATORS OFTEN SELECT WORDS FROM BOTH LISTS TO TAILOR INSTRUCTION TO THEIR STUDENTS' NEEDS, ENSURING A COMPREHENSIVE VOCABULARY FOUNDATION.

STRATEGIES FOR TEACHING THE 100 WORDS KIDS NEED TO READ BY 1ST GRADE

EFFECTIVELY TEACHING THESE ESSENTIAL WORDS REQUIRES A MULTIFACETED APPROACH THAT BALANCES RECOGNITION, UNDERSTANDING, AND APPLICATION.

BALANCING SIGHT WORDS AND PHONICS

A COMMON DEBATE IN EARLY LITERACY REVOLVES AROUND THE EMPHASIS ON SIGHT WORDS VERSUS PHONICS INSTRUCTION.
