Combining the Eastern philosophical tradition of Buddhism with Merleau-Ponty's phenomenology, *Merleau-Ponty and Buddhism* offers an intercultural philosophy in which opposites intermingle in a chiasmic relationship, and which brings new understanding regarding the self and the self's relation with others in a globalized and multicultural world.

Among his numerous innovations, Professor Tang is especially remembered for introducing the concept of “harmony in diversity”(*). In the context of “the clash of civilizations” championed by Samuel P.
