The students cut out small cards and staple them to another that forms the back, to create a booklet in which the cards are flipped up to create a new word each time. For example, for the pre- book the students read precaution. They flip up the word caution to reveal the word historic while the prefix pre remains. They then read prehistoric. This

continues with predetermine, preschool, preview, pretest, preshrunk and others to give them a total of nine different words all formed using the prefix pre. Each page also includes a definition of the prefix or suffix. The prefix pre means before, earlier, or in front of. In this way the students can actually see how a word changes by placing a prefix in front, or a suffix behind. As they flip through the nine words in each booklet, they internalize the meaning. This sure beats fill-in-the-blank worksheets! The following prefixes are covered in this book: anti-, bi-, dis-, hydro-, hyper-, in-, inter-, mis-, pre-, re-, sub-, tri-, un- and under-. The following suffixes are also included: -ful, -less, -ly, -ment, -ness, -ship and -y.

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
