WHO WAS THE FIRST GERMAN EMPRESS?

HISTORICALLY, THE FIRST WOMAN TO HOLD THE TITLE OF EMPRESS LINKED DIRECTLY TO GERMAN TERRITORIES WAS ADELHEID OF BURGUNDY (C. 931-999). SHE WAS MARRIED TO OTTO I, ALSO KNOWN AS OTTO THE GREAT, WHO WAS CROWNED HOLY ROMAN EMPEROR IN 962. OTTO'S CORONATION MARKED A REVIVAL OF THE IMPERIAL TITLE IN THE WEST AFTER THE FALL OF THE CAROLINGIAN EMPIRE AND IS OFTEN VIEWED AS THE FOUNDATION OF THE MEDIEVAL HOLY ROMAN EMPIRE.

ADELHEID, BY VIRTUE OF HER MARRIAGE AND OTTO'S IMPERIAL STATUS, BECAME THE FIRST GERMAN EMPRESS CONSORT IN THIS REVIVED IMPERIAL CONTEXT. HER ROLE EXTENDED BEYOND CEREMONIAL DUTIES; SHE WAS A POLITICALLY ACTIVE FIGURE WHO CONTRIBUTED TO THE CONSOLIDATION OF THE OTTONIAN DYNASTY'S POWER.

ADELHEID OF BURGUNDY: A CLOSER LOOK

The First German Empress
