Wise like a prophet, with a talent scout's enthusiasm, Garrett is not afraid to tell unwelcome truths, covering topics that include southern publishing houses and literary quarterlies, the alliance between writers and academia, the state of criticism and theory, and, most eloquently, the persistence of place, memory, and the Civil War as themes in southern letters. *Southern Excursions* is a book for the ages, stowing as it does the sage views of one as learned, respected—and modest—in his time as George Garrett. "My strong suggestion [to readers]," he states, "is to plunge in and fare forward. Experience the story before turning to or trusting the opinions and judgments of others, myself included."
